1 Overview

I took over as editor of *Te Reo* in January 2023. *Te Reo* has continued to publish linguistics research during 2023, with a slow but steady stream of submissions. We received 6 submissions and have accepted and published 3, with a fourth one invited for resubmission.

- One notable success this year is the increase of submissions focusing on Pacific languages and varieties, including Tomoip (an Austronesian language spoken in New Britain), Fiji Hindi, and Hawaiian Creole English. Please help encourage future submissions on the description and/or analysis of understudied Pacifika languages.
- We are excited to announce a soon-to-release special issue on te reo Māori (scheduled to be published in December 2023). Thank you to Julie Barbour and Peter Keegan for their time and work as guest editors, and to Miriam Meyerhoff for her role as the handling editor.
- Thanks to the efforts of our Book Review Editor, Susan Foster-Cohen, we have also published two book reviews and one book notice.
- The quantity of submissions remains lower than we had hoped. The current volume (Vol 66, <u>Issue 1</u>) contains 3 research articles, 2 book reviews, and 1 book notice. We hope to see an increase in the number of submissions in the future. Below is a summary of submissions over the past six years:

Submissions pertaining to the description and analysis of te reo or understudied Oceanic/ Polynesian languages are particularly welcomed. Students and junior researchers are highly encouraged to submit.

Book reviews. I am grateful to Susan Foster-Cohen for her dedication as a Book Review Editor and her willingness to continue her role. Since taking over the role, Te Reo has published 2 book reviews and 1 book notice.

Special issue. *Te Reo* will continue to aim to publish two issues per year: a regular issue which will accommodate all regular papers from January to December of each year, published online, on a rolling basis, and a special issue which will be edited by a volunteer editor (or team of editors) on a specific theme/topic and which will appear as a collection. Proposals for future special issues are welcomed at any time.

Thanks to Andreea Calude, Sally Nicholas, and Don Killian for creating a handy LaTeX style file for *Te Reo*. From January 2024, we will start to provide a free overleaf template, enabling future authors to (co)-write and submit their contribution in .tex formats using overleaf. *Te Reo*'s general stylesheet will also undergo some minor simplifications. The new version will appear on the TR site in January 2024 along with the overleaf template.
